Nokomis Ag Society will be available at the Jubilee Hall on Thursday from 3 pm to 7 pm and on Friday from 8 am to 11 am to accept exhibits. All exhibits must be delivered by 11 am on Friday before Fair day.

Judges are volunteers, and their decisions are final in all cases (see point 10 of the rules and regulations).

Section: Sheaves

Entry fee: \$1

Prizes: 1st \$16; 2nd \$12; 3rd \$8

Class 01: Hard Red Spring Wheat

Class 03: Canola. Do not strip leaves.

Class 02: Barley

Class 04: Wheat. Junior Exhibitor only, 18 years and under

All sheaves, except canola sheaves, must be stripped of leaves and measure not less than 2 inches in diameter, 6 inches below the head of grain. Sheaves to be full length of straw.

Scorecard for Sheaves

Utility 80%

20 - Purity, freedom of weeds, other kinds of varieties

15 - Size of sheaf and length of straw

15 - Maturity

10 - Freedom from evidence of disease and damage

Attractiveness 20%: Symmetry, firmness, neatness of material, position, and attractiveness of bands.

Section: Cleaned, Threshed Grain

Entry fee: \$1

Prizes: 1st \$7; 2nd \$5; 3rd \$3

Class 10: Hard Red Spring Wheat

Class 13: Canola

Class 11: Canada Prairie Spring Wheat

Class 14: Flax

Class 12: Barley

Class 15: Field Peas

All grain must be from the previous year's crop and can be entered only once.

All grain samples must be named and in 1-quart quantities.

Scorecard for Cleaned, Threshed Grains

20% - Soundness (freedom from injury)

20% - Plumpness

15% - Color

15% - Freedom from weed seeds

10% - Freedom from other grains and inter matter (volunteer grain, mixing, careless handling)

10% - Suitability and purity of variety

10% - Freedom from disease (ergot, smut, smudge, bacterial black point)

Prizes: 1st \$5; 2nd \$3; 3rd \$2

Class 20: Three green tomatoes

Class 24: Five white potatoes

Class 28: Eight pods of peas

Class 21: Three ripe tomatoes

Class 25: Five red potatoes

Class 29: Eight pods of beans

Class 22: Three beets

Class 26: Six cucumbers

Class 30: Five carrots

Class 23: One pumpkin

Class 27: Three stalks of rhubarb

Class 31: Collection of any five vegetables, 1 of each. Junior Exhibitor, 8 years of age and under

Class 32: Collection of any five vegetables, 1 of each. Junior Exhibitor, 9 years to 11 years of age

Class 33: Collection of any five vegetables, 1 of each. Junior Exhibitor, 12 years to 18 years

Class 34: Collection of 4 tomatoes: 2 green, 2 ripe. Junior Exhibitor, 8 years of age and under

Class 35: Collection of 4 tomatoes: 2 green, 2 ripe. Junior Exhibitor, 9 years to 11 years of age

Class 36: Collection of 4 tomatoes: 2 green, 2 ripe. Junior Exhibitor, 12 years to 18 years
